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CHARTER OF THE INSTITUTION OF ROYAL ENGINEERS.

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India :
To all to whom these Presents shall come, Greeting !

WHEREAS it has been represented to Us that Field-Marshal His Royal Highness Prince George William Frederick Charles, Duke of Cambridge, K.G., K.P., G.C.B., G.C.M.G., Commanding-in-Chief Our Forces ; Lieutenant-General Sir Frederick Edward Chapman, K.C.B., Inspector-General of Fortifications at Our War Office, London ; Colonel Thomas Lionel John Gallwey, Commandant of Our School of Military Engineering at Chatham ; Colonel James Frankfort Manners Browne, C.B., Deputy Adjutant-General, Royal Engineers, at Our War Office aforesaid ; Brevet Colonel Charles Cornwallis Chesney, Commanding Royal Engineers, Home District, Horse Guards, London ; Brevet Colonel Charles Brisbane Ewart, C.B., Deputy Director of Works for Barracks, at Our War Office aforesaid ; Brevet Colonel Charles Butler Peter Nugent Hodges Nugent, C.B., Deputy Director of Works for Fortifications, at Our War Office aforesaid ; Colonel Anthony Charles Cooke, C.B., Commanding Royal Engineers, Aldershot ; Lieutenant-Colonel Richard Hugh Stotherd, Royal Engineers, of Heathcote, Camberley, in the County of Surrey ; Lieutenant-Colonel Henry Schaw, Royal Engineers, Professor at Our Staff College at Sandhurst ; Major John Underwood Bateman-Champain, Royal Engineers, of the Indo-European Government Telegraph Department, Teheran, Persia ; Major Robert Grant, Deputy Assistant Adjutant-General, Royal Engineers, at Our War Office aforesaid ; Major Percy Guillemard Llewellyn Smith, Royal Engineers, Instructor at Our School of Military Engineering aforesaid ; Major Charles William Wilson, Royal Engineers, Assistant Quartermaster-General at Our War Office aforesaid ; Major Valentine Gardner Clayton, Royal Engineers, of Chatham ; Major William Merriman, Royal Engineers, of Colchester ; Captain George Edward Grover, Royal Engineers, of Camberley ; Captain Ernest Marsh Lloyd, Royal Engineers, Professor at Our Royal Military Academy at Woolwich ; Captain William de Wiveleslie Abney, Royal Engineers, Assistant Instructor at Our School of Military Engineering aforesaid ; Lieutenant Alexander Burness McHardy, Royal Engineers, of London, and Lieutenant Richard Henry Jelf, Royal Engineers, Adjutant of Our Royal Engineer Train, Aldershot, all of them since deceased, and Captain William Salmond, Royal Engineers (now Major-General Sir William Salmond, K.C.B., Colonel-Commandant of Our Corps of Royal Engineers, of Whaddon House, Bruton, in the County of Somerset) ; Lieutenant Elliott Wood, Royal Engineers (now Major-General Sir Elliott Wood, K.C.B., D.L., Colonel-Commandant of Our Corps of Royal Engineers, of Holmer Park, in the County of Hereford) ; Lieutenant Montagu Frederick Ommanney, Royal Engineers (now Captain Sir Montagu Frederick

Ommanney, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., I.S.O., of Knowles Lodge, Cuckfield, in the County of Sussex), and Lieutenant Herbert Jekyll, Royal Engineers (now Colonel Sir Herbert Jekyll, K.C.M.G., of Munstead House, Godalming, in the County of Surrey) and others Our Loving Subjects did in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five form themselves into a Society under the name of "The Royal Engineers Institute," and now known as "The Institution of Royal Engineers," having for its objects the general advancement of Military Science, and more particularly for promoting the acquisition of historical and scientific knowledge in relation to Engineering as applied to military purposes :

AND WHEREAS it has been further represented to us that the Institution was not constituted for gain, and that neither its projectors nor its members derive, nor have derived any pecuniary profit from its prosperity :

THAT it has during its existence, for a period of forty-seven years, steadily devoted itself to the promotion of efficiency in Our Services dealing with problems in relation to the defence of Our Realm and of Our Dominions beyond the Seas, and has thus materially assisted the highest interests of the State :

AND THAT the Members composing the Society have been, and are, practically engaged in work connected with the defence of Our Realm and of Our Dominions beyond the Seas, and that the Institution has, since its formation, diligently pursued the objects for which it was established by publishing Occasional, and other, papers on subjects connected with the Science and Art of Engineering in its application to military purposes and has thus provided a most valuable source of information of a technical kind to all who are engaged in dealing with problems connected with the defence of Our Realm and of Our Dominions beyond the Seas :

AND THAT a Journal, of which sixty-eight complete Volumes had been issued up to the end of the year 1921, is published by the Institution in parts at regular periodical intervals for the purpose of an early dissemination of important information of a professional character with a view to assisting its Members in the solution of current problems relating to the defence of Our Realm and of Our Dominions beyond the Seas :

AND THAT a Museum has been formed at Chatham by the Institution containing objects of military importance and interest, and that many of the exhibits possess a high educational value :

AND THAT Libraries have been established by the Institution in London and at other Military Centres with the object of rendering readily available to its Members, in all parts of Our Dominions, all published information of a scientific and technological character bearing upon problems of national defence :

AND THAT Trust Funds have been founded, and are being administered by the Institution, in connection with the award to Officers and Other Ranks of Our Corps of Royal Engineers of Prizes with a view to promoting Proficiency in the Science and Art of Engineering in its application to military purposes :

AND THAT the custody and maintenance by the Institution of Memorials belonging to Our Corps of Royal Engineers and erected in various parts of the World have to be provided for :

AND THAT arrangements have to be made for the proper custody and administration by the Institution of Funds handed over to the Institution in the years 1920 and 1921, in connexion with the award of Scholarships for the education of the children of deceased Officers and Other Ranks of the Corps of Royal Engineers who have fallen in the performance of their duties whilst on Active Service :

AND WHEREAS it has also been represented to us that it would add greatly to the influence of the Institution and tend to the better accomplishment of its objects and purposes and assure a better fulfilment of the aims aforesaid and that the property of the said Institution would be better secured, its useful operations extended, and at the same time a more permanent establishment be given it among the scientific institutions of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland by the grant of a Royal Charter of Incorporation :

NOW KNOW YE that We, taking the premises into Our Royal consideration and being desirous of encouraging a design so laudable and salutary, of Our special grace, certain knowledge and mere motion have willed, granted and declared, and Do by these Presents for Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, will, grant and declare in manner following, that is to say :—

INCORPORATION.

I. For the purpose of maintaining, carrying on and extending the work and objects, such of Our Loving Subjects as are now Members of the said Association or Institution known as The Institution of Royal Engineers and all such others as shall from time to time hereafter become Members thereof, according to such Bye-laws as shall be made as hereinafter mentioned, and their successors shall for ever be by Virtue of these Presents a Body Politic and Corporate, by the name and style of “ The Institution of Royal Engineers ” (hereinafter referred to as “ The Institution ”) and shall by the name have perpetual succession and a Common Seal with full power and authority to vary, alter, break and render the same at their discretion, and by the same name to sue or be sued in every Court of Us, Our Heirs and Successors, be for ever able and capable in law, notwithstanding the statutes of mortmain, to acquire, have, take and hold all the real estates, chattels real and personal estate, belonging to or held in trust for the Institution, and the property and moneys of the said existing Association or Institution known as The Institution of Royal Engineers (including any property and moneys held by it as a trustee) shall from the date of these Presents become and be deemed to be the property and moneys of the Institution, and shall, as soon as may be, be formally transferred to the Institution or such person or persons on its behalf as the Bye-laws may prescribe ; and shall also take, purchase and hold to them and their successors any goods, chattels and personal estate or property whatsoever, and all real estates and chattels real of whatsoever tenure which they or their successors shall think desirable for the use or purpose of the Institution, or to be held in connexion therewith with a view to the future advantage thereof, provided that the yearly value of the real estate and chattels real so to be acquired and held shall not at any time exceed in the whole the sum of six thousand pounds sterling according to the annual value thereof at the time when the same shall be respectively acquired by the Institution.

And they and their successors shall, subject to the provisions of these Presents, be able and capable in law to grant, sell, demise, alienate, exchange, mortgage, convey in mortmain or otherwise deal with or dispose of all or any of the property, real estate and chattels, real or personal property belonging to the Institution, in such manner as they may think fit, and by the name aforesaid do all other matters incidental or appertaining to a Body Corporate.

AND WE do hereby also for Ourselves, Our Heirs and Successors, give and grant Our Licence to any person or persons and any Body Politic or Corporate to assure in perpetuity or otherwise, or to demise to or for the benefit of the Institution, any lands, tenements or hereditaments whatsoever within the limits of value aforesaid, nevertheless declaring that it shall not be incumbent upon any such person, or persons, or Body to inquire as to the annual value of the property which may have been previously acquired by the Institution.

GENERAL MEETING.

II. There shall be a General Meeting or Meetings of the Members of the Institution, to be held from time to time as hereinafter mentioned, and there shall be a Council to direct and manage the concerns of the said Body Politic and Corporate, and the General Meetings and the Council shall have the entire direction and management of the same in the manner and subject to the regulations hereinafter mentioned.

PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENTS.

III. Of the Members of the said Council of the Institution one shall be the President and two or more shall be the Vice-Presidents of the Institution. The said President and Vice-Presidents shall be elected in such manner, and shall hold office for such period, and on such terms as to re-election and otherwise, as the Bye-laws for the time being of the Institution shall direct.

MEMBERS OF COUNCIL.

IV. The remaining Members of the said Council of the Institution shall consist of such numbers of Members, with such qualifications, and shall be elected or constituted as such Members of Council in such manner, and hold office for such period, and on such terms as to re-election or otherwise, as the Bye-laws for the time being of the Institution shall direct.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

VI. The first such General Meeting as aforesaid for the election of officers shall take place within twelve calendar months from the date of these Presents, and the present rules and regulations of the Institution, so far as they are not inconsistent with these Presents, shall continue in force until the same shall be altered by a General Meeting.

POWERS OF COUNCIL AND PROVISIONAL MANAGEMENT.

VII. The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the said Body Politic and Corporate, and the appointment of such Secretaries and Officers, Attendants and Servants as shall in the discretion of the Council be deemed necessary or useful for the Institution, as also the entire management and superintendence of all the other affairs and concerns thereof, and shall and may, but not if inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this Our Charter, or any existing Bye-law or laws, and statutes of this Our Realm, do all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary

or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the objects and views of the said Body Politic and Corporate.

POWER TO MAKE BYE-LAWS.

VIII. It shall be lawful for the Members of the said Body Politic and Corporate Established to hold a General Meeting once in the year or oftener, for the purpose hereinafter mentioned, namely, that the President, the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer and the other Members of Council shall be chosen at such General Meeting; and that the General Meeting shall from time to time make and establish such Bye-laws as they shall deem to be useful and necessary for the regulation of the said Body Politic and Corporate for the admission of Honorary Members, Members and Associate Members, for the management of the estates, goods, and business of the said Body Politic and Corporate, for fixing and determining the number of Vice-Presidents and other Members of Council and Associate Members of Council and the number of Secretaries as aforesaid, and the time and manner of electing the President, Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer, and other Members of Council and Associate Members of Council, and the periods of their respective continuance in office; and such Bye-laws from time to time they shall or may alter, vary, or revoke, and shall or may make such new and other Bye-laws as they shall think most useful and expedient for the said Body Politic and Corporate, so that the same be not repugnant to these Presents or to the laws and statutes of this Our Realm:

Provided that no such Bye-law, revocation, alteration, addition, abridgment or amendment shall take effect until the same has been submitted to a General Meeting of the Institution with respect to which notice has been given that such Bye-law, revocation, alteration, addition, abridgment or amendment will be taken into consideration thereat and approved thereat by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the Members voting on the question, and until the same has been submitted to and approved by the Lords of Our Privy Council, of which approval the Certificate of the Clerk of the Council shall be sufficient evidence.

EXISTING BYE-LAWS TO REMAIN IN FORCE.

IX. The Bye-laws set forth in the Schedule hereto shall be the Bye-laws of the Institution until the same shall be revoked, altered, added to, abridged or amended in manner hereinbefore provided.

SUPPLEMENTAL CHARTER.

X. The said Council may at any time alter, amend or add to these Presents and their provisions by a special resolution in that behalf, and such alteration, amendment or addition shall, when allowed by Us, Our Heirs and Successors, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, become effectual, so that these Presents shall thenceforward continue and operate as though they had been originally granted and made as so altered, amended or added to in manner aforesaid.

This Article of these Presents shall apply to this Charter as altered, amended or added to in manner aforesaid.

SURRENDER OF CHARTER.

XI. It shall be lawful for the Institution by such special resolution of the said Council to surrender this Our Charter and any such Supplemental Charter and to wind up the affairs of the Institution, but, if on the winding up or dissolution of the Institution, there shall remain after the satisfaction of all its debts and liabilities any property whatsoever, the same shall not be paid or distributed among the Members of the Institution or any of them, but shall (subject to any special trusts affecting the same) be given and transferred to some other Association or Associations having objects similar to the objects of the Institution, to be determined by the said Council at or before the time of dissolution or in default thereof by a Judge of the Chancery Division of Our High Court of Justice.

SPECIAL RESOLUTION.

XII. For the purpose of the two last preceding Articles the expression "Special Resolution" shall mean a resolution the terms whereof, together with a notification of the time and place for holding the meeting at which the same is to be proposed, shall, not less than one month or more than two months before the day of such meeting, have been published by such notices or advertisements or other methods as the said Council shall think desirable for giving due publicity to the said proposal and, which shall have been carried by a majority of not less than three-fourths of the Members present and voting at a meeting of the said Council specially called for the purpose, and shall have been confirmed by a majority of the Members present and voting at a subsequent meeting of that Council of which notice has been duly given, and held after an interval of not less than 14 days nor more than one month after the former meeting.

INTERPRETATION OF PROVISIONS OF CHARTER BY THE COURTS.

LASTLY WE do hereby, for Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, grant and declare that these Our Letters Patent, or the enrolment or exemplification thereof, shall be in all things good, firm, valid, and effectual, according to the true intent and meaning of the same, and shall be taken, construed and adjudged in all Our Courts or elsewhere in the most favourable and beneficial sense and for the best advantage of the said Institution, any mis-recital, non-recital, omission, defect, imperfection, matter or thing whatsoever notwithstanding.

IN WITNESS whereof We have caused these Our Letters to be made Patent.

WITNESS Ourselves at Westminster, the twenty-seventh day of February, in the Year of Our Lord One thousand nine hundred and twenty-three and in the Thirteenth year of Our Reign.

BYE-LAWS OF THE INSTITUTION OF ROYAL ENGINEERS.

I. OBJECT.

1.—The Institution of Royal Engineers has been established for the dissemination of information of a professional character among its members ; for the general advancement of Military Science, and more particularly for promoting the acquisition of historical and scientific knowledge such as is of paramount importance to the military engineer ; for the custody of certain corporate property of the Corps of Royal Engineers, including the R.E. Museum, the Corps Libraries and Corps Memorials, and for the administration of the funds, etc., in connexion therewith ; and, generally for fostering and furthering all such objects as have a bearing upon the professional activities of the Corps.

II. CONSTITUTION.

2.—The Institution of Royal Engineers shall consist of Members, of Associate Members and of Honorary Members. The Members alone shall be entitled to vote at General Meetings.

3.—The Members¹ shall consist of Officers on the Active and Retired Lists of the Corps of Royal Engineers, including those serving in the Special Reserve and Territorial Army, those belonging to the Engineer arm of British Overseas Forces, and also those holding Temporary Commissions in the Corps.

4.—The Associate Members² shall consist of such Officers and others as the Council may from time to time decide to be eligible for Associate Membership of the Institution and as shall be approved by the Annual General Meeting.

5.—The Honorary Members shall consist of gentlemen of eminence in professions, the activities of which are allied to the duties of the Corps

At a Council Meeting held on 25th October, 1945 (Actum 3692), the following decisions were made.

1. Decided that Bye-law 3 entitles the following officers to Full Membership of the Institution :—

- (a) All serving or retired regular Commissioned Officers of the Corps of Royal Engineers.
- (b) All officers serving, or who have served, in the Royal Engineer branch of any of the auxiliary forces in the U.K., such as Territorial Army, Supplementary Reserve, Special Reserve or Militia, etc., or who hold or have held, temporary or emergency Commissions in the Corps of Royal Engineers.
- (c) All officers serving, or who have served, in the engineer arm of the land forces, whether permanent or otherwise, of :—
 - (i) The Dominions.
 - (ii) India and Pakistan.
 - (iii) The Colonies or Dependencies.

Applications for Membership of such overseas officers to be submitted through the senior engineer officer of their Country.

2. Decided that under Bye-law 4 all officers referred to in footnote 1, paras. (b) and (c) shall be eligible for Associate Membership instead of Full Membership, if they so desire. Civilian officers of the Works Services Staff to be also eligible for Associate Membership, if recommended by the senior engineer officer of the Command in which they are serving.

of Royal Engineers. The number of such Honorary Members shall be limited, and shall be as laid down from time to time at the Annual General Meeting.

Honorary Members shall be elected by the Council. The honour shall be a personal one and shall in no case be conferred on the holder of an office as such. The fact that an Officer has served temporarily in the Corps or belongs to the Engineer arm of the British Overseas Forces or Territorial Army or Special Reserve or similar formations shall not disqualify him from election as an Honorary Member, but Officers of the Corps of Royal Engineers shall not be eligible for election as Honorary Members.

III. THE PATRON.

6.—There shall be a Patron, to be named by the Council.

IV. OFFICERS.

7.—The Officers of the Institution shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, fifteen ordinary Members of Council (exclusive of the *ex-officio* Members), a Secretary and Treasurer, and such Corresponding Members as the Council may from time to time appoint.

8.—The President and Vice-Presidents shall be elected by the Council. The vacancies in the Council shall be filled annually at the Annual General Meeting. An Auditor for the year shall be annually elected at the Annual General Meeting. In the event of vacancies occurring by death, resignation or otherwise in any of these offices between the Annual General Meetings, the Council shall have power to fill up such vacancies, subject to confirmation and approval at the next Annual General Meeting.

9.—The Treasurer shall be appointed by the Council and removed at the pleasure of the Council. The Secretary shall be selected by the Council from among the Officers on the Active and Retired Lists of the Corps of Royal Engineers; the appointment of this officer shall be subject to the approval of the Army Council. These two offices may be combined. The Council may at any time appoint such other officers or staff as it may from time to time consider necessary, and may pay to its officers and staff such salaries as may appear to the Council to be fitting, and offices may be taken at the discretion of the Council.

V. THE COUNCIL.

10.—The Council shall consist of (i) the President and two Vice-Presidents; (ii) *ex-officio* Members not exceeding eight; (iii) fifteen elected Members; (iv) Corresponding Members not exceeding seven and the Secretary and the Treasurer. Seven Members shall be a quorum.

11.—The *ex-officio* Members shall be Officers holding certain appointments in the Corps and in the Army; the Council shall, from time to time, subject to the approval of the Army Council, designate the appointments the holders whereof shall serve as *ex-officio* Members on the Council.

The elected Members shall serve for three years, and be chosen from among Officers on the Active and Retired Lists of the Corps.

The Corresponding Members shall serve for three years, and be Members or Associate Members¹ nominated by the Council.

12.—The Council shall have the entire management of the property and funds of the Institution, and the direction of all the affairs and concerns of the Institution, and shall have power to purchase or otherwise acquire on behalf of the Institution lands and tenements and other property, to erect and maintain buildings required for the purposes of the Institution, and to dispose, by sale, exchange or otherwise, of the property of which the Institution may become possessed. The Council shall also have power to borrow money for the purposes of the Institution on the security of the property of the Institution, or any part thereof, or otherwise, and generally the Council may do all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or expedient to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the objects of the Institution.

13.—The Council shall have power to make such Bye-laws, Rules and Regulations with respect to the summoning, notice, place, management and adjournment of their Meetings and generally with respect to the transaction and management of business by the Council, or by any Committee of the Council, as they may think fit, no Bye-law being in any case altered or new one proposed without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each Member of the Council.

14.—The Council shall have power from time to time to appoint Committees of its Members and to delegate to such Committees respectively any power or business as the Council may think fit.

VI. GENERAL MEETING.

15.—There shall be an Annual General Meeting of the Institution held in London on a date in the month of May, June or July of each year to be fixed by the Council, of which not less than four weeks' notice shall be given.

16.—Special General Meetings shall be held whenever summoned by the President, or the Council, or on requisition as hereinafter provided, not less than fifteen days' notice thereof to be given.

17.—The Council shall present to the Annual General Meeting a Report of the condition of the Institution with such particulars as the Council may think requisite. A printed copy of the Report, together with a financial statement, audited by a Chartered Accountant, shall be circulated to Members not less than fourteen days before the date of the Annual General Meeting.

On the occasion of any such vacancies having occurred on the Council as are required to be filled by the Institution in General Meeting assembled, the General Meeting shall proceed to fill up such vacancies by election.

A General Meeting may transact any business, although not in these Bye-laws specially mentioned, as shall be laid before it by the Council.

Twenty Members shall be a quorum at any General Meeting of the Institution.

If at any General Meeting of the Institution twenty Members are not

present within one hour after the time appointed for holding the same, the Meeting shall stand adjourned *sine die*.

18.—The Council shall convene a special General Meeting of the Institution on the written requisition of any fifty Members of the Institution within thirty days from the date of the receipt of such requisition. Such requisition shall state the particulars of, and business to be transacted, at such Meeting, notice of which shall be given so as to reach the Secretary not less than twenty-one clear days prior to the date on which such Meeting is to be held.

19.—The Council shall fix the place of all General Meetings, whether Annual or Special.

VII. SUBSCRIPTIONS.

20.—The fees and subscriptions payable by Members and Associate Members shall be at rates fixed from time to time by the Council subject, to confirmation and approval by the General Meeting. No fees or subscriptions shall be required from Honorary Members.

VIII. PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS.

21.—Members shall receive free of cost one copy of all the regular and periodical publications of the Institution, and also of any such special publications as the Council may resolve to issue free. They shall receive other special publications and additional copies of regular publications at rates laid down by the Council. Members may receive such educational grants and such assistance in connexion with the printing of Reports and other matter as the Council shall from time to time determine. Associate and Honorary Members shall receive free, or at such rates as shall be determined by the Council such of the publications as the Council may decide.

22.—Membership of the Institution shall continue until notice of withdrawal is given in writing to the Secretary; with the exceptions specified in the next section.

Any Member who ceases to belong to the Institution by resignation shall be eligible for readmission on payment of a fresh entrance fee. Any Member who ceases by default shall not be eligible for readmission without paying all arrears of annual subscriptions from the date of his last payment.

IX. EXPULSION OF MEMBERS.

23.—Any Member¹ failing to pay his annual subscriptions after two applications shall have his name removed from the list of Members at the discretion of the Council.

24.—If any six Members of the Council state at a Council Meeting that they consider it desirable that a Member of the Institution shall cease to be a Member, the matter shall be considered at the next Council Meeting,

¹ Decided that a Member whose subscription is more than one year in arrears shall receive none of the Institution publications. A member whose subscription is more than three years in arrears shall, after due notice, have his name removed from the list of Members, but can be reinstated at the discretion of the Council on making a satisfactory explanation and paying all arrears of subscriptions. which shall be summoned specially for the purpose, due notice and particulars of the complaint being sent to the Member concerning whose conduct a complaint has been lodged, in order that he may be present if he deems fit. The quorum for such a Special Meeting shall be fourteen. If those present at the Special Council Meeting unanimously resolve that the Member shall cease to be a Member, his name shall be struck off the list of Members, and he may not again become a Member; he shall be informed accordingly by the Secretary.

X. R.E. MUSEUM.

25.—The R.E. Museum shall be in the charge of the Council of the Institution of Royal Engineers. It will contain patterns of uniforms and equipment; military engineering material and models; sketches, plans, etc.; photographs; letters, books, manuscripts and printed matter connected with the work or campaigns of the Corps; regimental or personal relics and trophies of war. The museum shall be financed from the funds of the Institution and managed in accordance with rules and regulations made in that behalf by the Council.

XI. R.E. LIBRARIES.

26.—The R.E. Corps Library shall be administered by the Council of the Institution of Royal Engineers and shall be available for use by all Members, Associate Members and Honorary Members of the Institution, without extra charge, and by such other officers as may be determined by the Council of the Institution.

27.—The Council of the Institution of Royal Engineers may establish branch libraries at such stations as may from time to time be determined.

28.—The Council of the Institution of Royal Engineers will also make such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the management and control of the H.Q. and branch libraries.

XII. MEMORIALS MAINTENANCE AND MEMORIAL TRUST FUNDS.

29.—The Council of the Institution of Royal Engineers shall administer the R.E. Memorials Maintenance Fund, The R.E. Kitchener Scholarships Fund, and such Memorial Trust Funds as have been, or may be, from time to time, placed in its charge, in accordance with the conditions under which each Fund was or shall be established.

XIII. ADVERTISEMENTS.

30.—All notices of Meetings, and other notices required to be given to the Members generally, shall be in the form of public advertisements inserted in the official publication of the Institution of Royal Engineers, or such other newspaper as the Council may from time to time determine (see also Rule 42).

XIV. AMENDMENT OF BYE-LAWS.

31.—The above Bye-laws shall not be altered or added to except by a special resolution passed at a General Meeting. A resolution of the Institution

shall be deemed to be special which has been duly passed at the Annual General Meeting, or some adjournment thereof, or at a Special Meeting, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two Members qualified to vote as Proposer and Seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary of the Council, or sent to him by registered post so as to reach the office of the Institution not less than forty-five days previous to the Annual General Meeting or the Special General Meeting as the case may be. The Council shall cause notice to be given of all such proposed resolutions by two advertisements such as hereinbefore mentioned, the first to be inserted at least thirty days previous to such General Meeting. No substantial amendment to such resolution shall be adopted unless a notice in writing of the terms of such amendment, signed by two Members qualified to vote as Proposer and Seconder thereof shall have been given to the Secretary, or sent to him by registered post so as to reach the office of the Institution not less than twenty-one days previous to such General Meeting. The Council shall cause all such proposed amendments to be advertised at least once previous to such General Meeting ; provided that any amendment to such resolution if carried unanimously be adopted, although no previous notice thereof shall have been given.

XV. COMMON SEAL OF THE INSTITUTION.

32.—The Common Seal of the Institution shall not be affixed to any deed or document except by authority of a previous order or resolution of the Council, and in the presence of two Members of the Council, and of the Secretary.

RULES OF THE INSTITUTION OF ROYAL ENGINEERS

I. OFFICERS.

1. The President and two Vice-Presidents shall be Members of the Institution of Royal Engineers, and one at least of the three shall be serving on the Active List. The period of tenure of each of these offices shall, in the first instance, be three years, but the holders are eligible for re-election, provided always that no officer shall hold any one and the same of these offices for more than five years continuously. A Member shall be eligible for re-election to either of these offices at the expiration of one year from the date upon which he last vacated the same.

II. ELECTED MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

2. The elected Members shall be chosen by ballot annually at the General Meeting, Members who cannot be present being entitled to vote by post. For the purpose of filling the vacancies which may exist on its body the Council shall annually nominate a number of Members, exceeding by at least 50 per cent the number of the said vacancies to be filled. In addition to the nominations made by the Council as aforesaid, the Members of the Institution may also nominate any number of their body as candidates to compete for the vacancies on the Council. In the latter case nomination papers shall be sent in respect of each candidate last mentioned. Each such nomination paper shall bear the signatures of at least five Members as supporters, and shall be placed in the hands of the Secretary of the Institution not later than on the 1st April immediately preceding the General Meeting at which the election is to be held. The Council shall circulate to the Members of the Institution at least four weeks prior to the date for the General Meeting the names of the candidates nominated by itself as well as those of the candidates duly nominated by the general body of Members; in the case of the nominees of the Members of the Institution there shall be stated against the name of each such candidate last mentioned the names of his supporters.

(Note.—A notice published in the *Monthly Supplement to the R.E. Journal* complying with the above requirements shall, for the purposes of this Rule, be deemed to be a circulation of the names of the candidates aforesaid.)

3. No Member shall be eligible for re-election until the expiration of one year after leaving office.

4. A Member proceeding on foreign service shall automatically vacate office on the date of his leaving the British Isles.

5. Vacancies occurring between the General Meetings shall be filled by the Council by co-option; every appointment so made shall date as from that of the previous General Meeting.

III. EX-OFFICIO MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

6. The *ex-officio* Members of the Council shall be :—
 The Engineer-in-Chief, or Deputy Engineer-in-Chief if the E.-in-C.
 is elected as President or Vice-President of the Council.
 The Assistant Adjutant-General, Royal Engineers.
 The Commandant, School of Military Engineering.
 The Director of Transportation.
 The Director of Fortifications and Works.
 The Director of Survey.
 and two Officers on the Active List holding appointments as nominated
 by the Council.

IV. CORRESPONDING MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL.

7. The Corresponding Members shall be appointed by the Council.
 They shall vacate their office automatically upon change of station, but shall
 always be eligible for immediate re-election. They shall act as local agents
 at home and abroad for the collection of information which may be of value
 to Members of the Institution, and for carrying out on the instruction of
 the Council such other duties as may, from time to time, be found necessary.

V. THE SECRETARY.

8. The Secretary shall be elected by the Council. The appointment
 shall be held for one year on probation ; thereafter a further extension
 for a period up to four years may be granted, provided always that, during
 the period last named, notice of determination of the contract on either
 side shall, in every case, be given, should it be desired to terminate the
 contract of service by mutual consent. The Secretary shall, on the completion
 of any period for a full term of five years or over, be eligible for re-election
 for such further time as the Council shall decide, but after the holder of
 the appointment shall have reached the age of 60 years his retention shall
 be subject to review each year, and he shall in no case hold the appointment
 after reaching the age of 65 years.

9. The Secretary shall be the chief executive officer of the Institution
 and shall control the Staff of the Institution.

He shall be the Editor of all the Institution publications, and shall be
ex-officio Secretary of the Standing Committees, and of all other Committees
 of Council, except in such cases as a Special Secretary shall be appointed.

The Secretary, or Acting Secretary, of the Standing Committees, if a
 Member of the Institution, shall be a Member for purposes of determining
 a quorum, and shall be entitled to vote.

The Secretary shall have charge of all the Institution property (except
 as hereafter provided for), including the Museum, and the Corps Library
 at Chatham ; he shall be responsible for the proper custody of the Institu-
 tion Seal. He shall keep a Roll of the Corps in manuscript and shall take
 measures to maintain it up to date.

The Secretary shall undertake such other duties as the Council may,
 from time to time, direct.

VI. THE TREASURER.

10. The Treasurer shall be responsible for the proper custody of all
 titles to the property of the Institution, including all bonds and certificates

relating to the stocks and shares possessed by it or placed in its charge ; he shall make proper arrangements for the care of and disbursements made from the cash belonging to the Institution.

He shall keep a correct statement of the assets and liabilities of every one of the Funds pertaining to the Institution (for the Funds existing as at 31st December, 1948, *see* Schedule A) and shall keep such ledgers and cash books, prepare such statements of accounts as are required annually by the Auditors, and periodically by the Council, or any of its Standing or other Committees.

He shall make such payments as are duly authorized by the Council, or by the authority delegated by the Council to any of the Standing or other Committees ; he shall see that the receipts in respect of such payments are in order and shall file them in safe custody.

He shall make such purchases or sales of stocks, shares, or other property of the Institution as shall be duly authorized by the Council ; the order to the agents, or others, for the carrying out of these transactions shall be given in writing and signed by him as Treasurer and by two other Members of the Council, and shall be duly sealed when so required by law. All cheques issued by the Treasurer on behalf of the Institution, or of any of the Funds administered by it, shall be signed by the Treasurer and also by one Member of the Council.

He shall credit all amounts received by the Institution to the appropriate accounts, the entrance fees being paid into the Reserve Fund of the Institution.

The duties of the Treasurer may be performed by the Secretary.

VII. STANDING COMMITTEES.

11. There shall be three Standing Committees :—

- (1) The Finance and Membership Committee.
- (2) The Publications and Library Committee.
- (3) The Museum, Memorials and R.E. Kitchener Scholarships Committee.

The Council shall appoint the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman and all or any Members of each Standing Committee, and of any other Committee which may be brought into existence.

Except in the case of the Finance and Membership Committee, which shall be composed of Members of Council only, the Members of the Committees may consist partly of Members of the Council and partly of other Members of the Institution. The latter may be co-opted by the Committee concerned.

The President of the Council shall be an *ex-officio* Member of all Committees.

12. The Finance and Membership Committee shall supervise generally the administration of all the Funds of the Institution and shall advise the Council on all financial matters, and particularly those relating to the holding, purchase, or sale of stocks and shares by the Council. It shall make such payments as the Council may delegate to its authority.

The Committee shall advise the Council on all questions arising regarding

the rates of subscription to be paid, the assumption, resignation, renewal and lapse by default of Membership or Associate Membership.

The Committee shall advise the Council each year at its October Meeting as to the total sum which shall be placed at the disposal of the several Standing and other Committees.

13. *The Publications and Library Committee* shall act as an Advisory Committee in relation to *The R.E. Journal* and shall assist the Editor in obtaining suitable "copy" and in deciding upon the publication or rejection of copy of doubtful merit; it shall advise the Council as to the publication of Books, Professional Papers, and Descriptive Accounts of Foreign Stations.

It shall decide upon all rewards for published contributions; and advise the Council each year at the January Meeting as to the awarding of the Montgomerie and Arthur Ffolliott Garrett prizes for the preceding year.

It shall control the funds allotted to the Libraries, and shall advise the Council on all questions connected with the maintenance and policy of the Libraries.

14. *The Museum, Memorials and Scholarships Committee* shall control the funds of the R.E. Museum and advise the Council as to the purchase of suitable objects. Should delay be likely to result in the loss of a suitable object, the Committee may authorize its purchase, so long as the price thereof does not exceed £50, subject to the covering authority of the Council. The Committee shall control the management of the Museum, and deal with the duties of the Curator and all questions affecting his appointment, leave and pay.

The Committee shall also administer the Memorials Maintenance Fund, the Memorial Trust Funds and R.E. Kitchener Scholarships Fund, in accordance with the objects for which each of them shall have been founded. (*See Schedule B.*)

It shall supervise and make the necessary arrangements for the upkeep of the R.E. Memorials.

The Committee will administer the R.E. Kitchener Scholarships or any other similar funds, shall select the beneficiaries, subject to the approval of the Council, and shall generally perform such administrative acts that may be necessary in relation to such funds as may be directed by the Council.

VIII. AUDITORS.

15. The Auditors shall be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting of the Institution and shall be eligible for re-election.

IX. COUNCIL MEETINGS.

16. The Council shall meet at least four times in the year; at each such Meeting there shall be laid before the Council such reports of the Standing and other Committees as have been prepared since the preceding Meeting.

17. Members of the Council and of the Standing and other Committees, who are summoned to attend Meetings of the Council or of Committees, shall be entitled to be reimbursed their reasonable expenses in all cases

where the said Members reside more than 10 miles from the appointed place of the Meeting.

X. GENERAL MEETINGS.

18. The Annual General Meeting of the Institution shall be held on the same day as the Annual General Meeting of the Corps of Royal Engineers.

19. Any Member of the Institution desiring to bring forward at the Annual General Meeting any proposition regarding the affairs of the Institution or any proposal for alteration of these Rules shall submit his proposal or proposals in writing, signed by himself and another Member as seconder, to the Secretary before 1st April.

XI. SUBSCRIPTIONS.

20. The Subscription for Ordinary Members shall be as follows :—

(i) Entrance Subscription, £1.

(ii) Annual Subscription, payable in advance on 1st January :—

(a) General Officers, Colonels and Lieut.-Colonels	£2	0	0
(b) Majors	1	15	0
(c) Captains	1	10	0
(d) Lieutenants	1	5	0
(e) 2nd Lieutenants	1	0	0
(f) Q.M. or E. & M.O. of any rank	1	5	0

Retired Officers shall pay at the rate of the rank held by them on retirement.

21. The subscription for Associate Members shall be as follows :—

(i) Entrance Subscription, *nil*.

(ii) Annual Subscription, payable in advance on 1st January, £1.

While an Associate Member acts as a Corresponding Member, he shall not be liable to pay the annual subscription.

XII. PUBLICATIONS.

22. The periodical publications of the Institution shall be as follows :—

(i) *The Royal Engineers Journal*.

(ii) *The Monthly Supplement to the Royal Engineers Journal*.

(iii) *The Royal Engineers List*.

All of the above publications shall be issued free of charge to Members.

The first-named publication only shall be issued free of charge to Associate Members and Honorary Members.¹

23.—The other publications of the Institution shall be as follows :—

(i) The Professional Papers of the Institution of Royal Engineers, of which some may be Confidential.

(ii) Special publications, which will include all not mentioned above.

The above publications shall be issued free of charge or on payment, as the Council may determine, to Members, Associate Members and Honorary Members.

24. *The Royal Engineers Journal* will contain military and other articles of interest to the Army at large, technical articles of interest to the Members

¹ Associate Members who, previous to 24th October, 1945, have received all three publications, shall continue to do so if they so desire.

of the Institution, memoirs, professional notes, transcripts and translation from other publications, reviews of books, notices of other periodicals, and correspondence.

25. The *Monthly Supplement to the R.E. Journal* will contain matter of appropriate or regimental character, such as :—Notices and discussions on Corps Funds ; institutions and memorials ; station news ; accounts of games, yachting, rowing, musketry, races and sports generally ; personal notes ; Army news and orders affecting the Corps ; domestic occurrences ; Corps news ; extracts from official dispatches, gazettes and Corps memoranda.

26. The *Royal Engineers List* will take such form and will contain such matter as may, from time to time, be determined by the Council.

27. The Professional Papers of the Institution of Royal Engineers will contain articles which, by reason of their importance, length, number of illustrations or special technical nature, are not appropriate to *The Royal Engineers Journal*. They will be issued in pamphlet form, one by one as published.

28. The special publications shall include books, etc., published primarily for the use of the officers of the Corps of Royal Engineers, such as :— *Work of the Royal Engineers in the War of 1914-19*, 9 Vols., *History of the Corps of Royal Engineers*, *Military Engineer in India*, 2 Vols., *The Royal Engineers in Egypt and the Sudan*, *Descriptive Accounts of Foreign Stations*, etc.

29. Any publications of the Institution, with the exception of the *Monthly Supplement to the Royal Engineers Journal*, the *Royal Engineers List* and such papers and documents as are confidential, may be sold to the public at such prices as the Council may determine.

30. Retired officers, who have been Members of the Institution throughout their service and who do not desire to continue full Membership after retirement, may subscribe to the regular publications of the Institution on the basis of prices applicable to Members. Regular Officers, permanently transferred to other arms or services, and who resign membership of the Institution, may also subscribe to the regular publications of the Institution on the basis of prices applicable to Members.

31. The Council may, if it thinks fit, and subject to such conditions as it may determine, undertake the publication, for Members, of reports or works of interest to the Members in general.

32. Subject to the above Rules the publications of the Institution may be presented or given in exchange to such individuals, government departments, institutions and societies as the Council may, from time to time, decide, subject to War Office security regulations.

33. In return for a similar concession on the part of the Royal Artillery Institution, Members of the Institution of Royal Engineers may obtain the publications of the Royal Artillery Institution at the rates applicable to its Members. (See *The R.E. Journal*, 1877, page 105.)

XIII. R.E. LIBRARIES.

34. The object of the R.E. Libraries shall be to enable Members to refer to the works of the best authorities in any of the multifarious duties which they, as officers of the Royal Engineers, are liable to be called upon to

perform, such works being necessarily more numerous and more expensive than an officer can be expected to possess or to carry with him.

35. The management of the R.E. Libraries shall be vested in the Council of the Institution.

36. Members, Associate Members and Honorary Members of the Institution of Royal Engineers may use the Libraries without additional payment.

37. Officers performing the duties of Royal Engineers, and surveyors and other officials connected with Royal Engineer offices, shall be permitted to make use (without payment) of the Libraries at the stations where they are quartered.

38. Chief Engineers may, at their discretion, extend the use of the Library without payment to officers of Other Arms, who may be temporary members of the R.E. Mess or temporarily attached for courses to the R.E. at a station concerned where there is a Branch Library.

XIV. MEMORIALS MAINTENANCE FUND AND MEMORIAL TRUST FUNDS.

39. The purpose of the Memorials Maintenance Fund is to keep in a proper state of repair the Memorials erected by the Corps of Royal Engineers (*vide* Schedule C). It shall receive, for this purpose, the unexpended balances of all Memorial Funds, or of the Memorial Trust Funds. It may also receive endowments for the maintenance of specific Memorials.

40. The Memorial Trust Funds (*vide* Schedule B) were established for the purpose of presenting medals and prizes in memory of officers of the Corps of Royal Engineers and shall be administered in the following manner :—

(i) The capital standing in the name of each fund shall be maintained for its original purpose, and the annual income therefrom shall be devoted to the carrying out of the object for which the fund was established.

(ii) The balance of the annual income of each fund, after all expenses for the year have been paid, shall be transferred to the Memorials Maintenance Fund, provided that the dies (or other plant) belonging to each fund shall be maintained as a first charge out of the general credit of the Maintenance Fund.

41. The practice of accepting personal memorials in the form of medals and other prizes shall, in future, be restricted to very exceptional cases, and would-be donors shall be asked to subscribe instead to the R.E. Kitchener Scholarships Fund or to the R.E. Benevolent Fund. No personal memorial shall be accepted without the consent of the Annual Corps Meeting.

XV. ADVERTISEMENTS.

42. The *Monthly Supplement to the Royal Engineers Journal* shall, for the purpose of Bye-Law 30, be the official organ of the Institution of Royal Engineers.

XVI. ALTERATIONS TO RULES.

43. The above Rules shall not be altered or added to except with the consent of a General Meeting of the Institution.

R.E. Corps Libraries were incorporated as part of the Institution of Royal Engineers in 1939.

SCHEDULE B.

LIST OF R.E. TRUST FUNDS.

FOWKE MEDAL.

Originated in 1866. A silver medal, awarded annually (if merited), on the recommendation of the Commandant, S.M.E., to a Young Officer considered to have specially distinguished himself in the School of Construction now Civil Engineering School,

Two silver medals now awarded (Annual Meeting 1932).

A bronze medal, awarded annually (if merited), on the recommendation of the Commandant, S.M.E., to a N.C.O. or Sapper lately passed through the School of Construction (now Civil Engineering School) and considered to have specially distinguished himself.

In 1948 (Council Actum 3766) it was decided to combine the Fowke and Stokes-Roberts Prizes (see note under Stokes-Roberts Prize).

DURAND MEDAL.

Originated in 1876. A bronze medal, awarded annually, on the recommendation of the Commandants of the Q.V.O. Madras, K.G.V.O. Bengal and Royal Bombay Sappers and Miners through the Commander-in-Chief in India, to a Viceroy's Commissioned Indian Officer, N.C.O. or Sapper of these Corps in turn, who has distinguished himself as a soldier and a sapper by good and efficient service.

Council Actum 3782 (e) of 28.7.48 approved, as the result of the handing over of power in India to the new governments of India and Pakistan in 1947, that a bronze medal be presented annually to any officer of Viceroy's Commissioned Officer Status, Warrant Officer, Non-Commissioned Officer or Sapper of the Corps of Indian Engineers or Royal Pakistan Engineers who, in the opinion of their respective Engineers-in-Chief, has distinguished himself as a soldier and a Sapper by good and efficient service.

The award to be allocated on the basis of two years to the Indian Engineers to one year to the Royal Pakistan Engineers.

HAYNES MEDAL.

Originated 1898. A bronze medal, awarded, on the recommendation of the O.C. Training Battalion, R.E., through the Commandant, S.M.E., to the Sapper in each batch of recruits considered best qualified in Field-works.

Council Actum 3875 (a) of 31.1.51 decided that the medal be awarded to the N.C.O. who passes out top of each Corporals' Cadre Class on the recommendation of the Commander, Training Brigade, R.E.

ARMSTRONG MEDAL AND PRIZE.

Originated in 1899. A silver medal, awarded, as the result of the usual Examination at the R.M.A., Woolwich, to the Gentleman Cadet in each term who shows the greatest proficiency in Electricity.

A watch, or other suitable memento for the best Student at the conclusion of each Mechanist (E. and M.) Course at the S.M.E.

In 1948 owing to purchase tax and high costs of labour and materials it was decided as a temporary measure to give a special "austerity" type of medal and a book, value approximately 35s., to the officer Cadet who obtains the most marks in Science in each batch passing out of the R.M.A. Sandhurst.

A book value 30s. to be presented to the best student passing out of the Clerk of Works (E) Class at the S.M.E.

MONTGOMERIE PRIZE.

Originated in 1902. Books and money prizes, awarded by the Council of the Institution in the manner they consider best for the encouragement of contributions on professional subjects to the Corps publications by R.E. Officers, who are not above the rank of substantive Major.

COLLINSON PRIZE.

Originated in 1905. A saddle, or other article useful in the performance of professional duties, awarded, by ballot in the batch, to an Officer of each batch of Young Officers on completion of the course at the S.M.E.

RAINEY ANDERSON PRIZE.

Originated in 1909. Awarded half-yearly for the highest marks in two languages obtained by a Cadet obtaining a Commission in the Royal Engineers.

(In 1935 (Actum 3320) the Council decided that while no such Cadet studied languages, the prizes should be temporarily allocated to advanced mathematics.) (Annual General Meeting, 1935.)

Council Actum 3745 of 30.4.47 decided that the prize be given to the Cadet commissioned into the R.E. who obtains the highest marks in obligatory languages.

Council Actum 3912 (b) of 31.1.52 decided that the prize be given to the R.E. Cadet who does best on the Advanced Course at the R.M.A., Sandhurst.

STOKES-ROBERTS SCHOLARSHIP PRIZE.

Originated in 1922. An annual prize to be competed for by N.C.O.'s undergoing a construction course at the S.M.E. under conditions laid down by the Commandant, S.M.E.

In 1948 (Council Actum 3766) in view of purchase tax and the high cost of labour and materials it was decided to combine the Stokes-Roberts and Fowke Funds in order to provide sufficient money to give a prize to both Young Officers' and Foreman of Works' Classes at the S.M.E.

THE ARTHUR FFOLLIOTT GARRETT PRIZE.

Founded by Mrs. Garrett in 1923 in memory of her husband, the late Major Arthur ffolliott Garrett, O.B.E., R.E., with a sum of £200, to provide

a prize, in the form of a piece of plate, to be awarded for an essay,¹ the subject of which is to be set annually, on one of the following branches of engineering :—

- (1) Irrigation or Water Supply ;
- (2) Railways ;
- (3) Survey ;

to regular officers of the Corps who are not above the rank of substantive Major on the first day of the year.

The Council decided (24.1.39) that in the event of there being, during any year, no article of outstanding merit on one of the subjects laid down for the Garrett Prize, the prize shall be given for an article on some other subject which would have been eligible for the Montgomerie Prize.

ALAN IZAT MEMORIAL PRIZE.

Founded by Mrs. Jessie Izat in memory of her husband, the late Captain Alan Izat, R.E., with a sum of £715 to provide a prize to be awarded each term to the top Cadet who passes out of the Royal Military Academy and is recommended for a commission in the Royal Engineers and who has not gained the prize awarded to the Cadet who passes out first or has been awarded the Sword of Honour.

The Council of the Institution of Royal Engineers is authorized to vary the conditions of the Alan Izat Memorial Prize at any time and from time to time, subject to the prize going to cadets recommended for commission in the Royal Engineers or the organization which for the time being represents the Royal Engineers as at present constituted.

The Council decided (Actum 3766 of 28.1.48), in consequence of the introduction of an Institution of R.E. Prize to the top R.E. Cadet that the prize should be given to the second highest Sapper cadet, with no conditions regarding the receipt of a Scholarship or Sword of Honour. (See also Actum 3745 of 30.4.47.)

SCHEDULE C.

(OTHER PRIZES—NOT TRUST FUNDS)

INSTITUTION OF R.E. PRIZE

In 1948 (Council Actum 3766(h)) it was decided that the Institution of R.E. would award a prize of £50 to the top Cadet commissioned into the R.E. from each batch at the R.M.A. Sandhurst.

Council Actum 3826 of 26.10.49 approved the award of a silver medal in addition to the £50 cash prize.

CLERK OF WORKS (M) PRIZE.

In 1948 (Council Actum 3774(c)) in consequence of the separation of Mechanist (E) and Mechanist (M) Classes at the S.M.E. it was decided to give a prize of a book (value 30s.) to the best student in each Mechanist (M) Class at the S.M.E.—(Mechanists (E) get the Armstrong Prize)—This prize to be provided by the Institution of R.E.

In 1949 the titles were changed to Clerk of Works (M) and Clerk of Works (E).

¹ The essay was discontinued in 1929 and the prize awarded for the best contributions on these subjects to the Institution publications.
